

Project Background

The goal of this project is to collect information on the distribution and abundance of waterbirds in the Port of Saint John

The project began in 2019 as a baseline study funded through Fisheries and Oceans Canada's Coastal Environmental Baseline Program



Since then, it has grown into a large citizen science initiative that you can be a part of!

Birders from across the region travel to a variety of coastal sites around Saint John to monitor waterbirds, contributing to our knowledge of what birds use the area and when.

Inform oil spill preparedness:

Inform future projects, studies, and assessments




Detect changes to bird distribution and abundance from pressures like human disturbance, climate change, etc.
