



Protecting Species at Risk from **PREDATION ON FARMLANDS**

Studies show that anywhere from 105 to 348 million birds are killed by domestic cats in Canada each year.

Pets add extra pressure on species at risk as these animals are not present in natural habitats. Other predators commonly found on farms, like raccoons and crows, also impact species at risk such as turtles and birds.

OBJECTIVES

To reduce increased risk of predation on species at risk on farms, we want to:

- Limit the presence of free-roaming cats on farms
- Develop grain and refuse storage incentives to reduce predator attraction
- Explore and promote predator deterrent options for farms
