



Improving forest management for **SPECIES AT RISK ON FARMS**

Forests provide important services to wildlife and people and are a part of our natural heritage. In the Wolastoq//Saint John River Watershed, there is a unique forest type called the Appalachian Hardwood Forest. This forest type is a distinct assemblage of tree, understory plant, and moss species that contains more diversity than any other forest types in New Brunswick. Some tree species of this forest include the butternut, ironwood, and sugar maple. Oftentimes, Appalachian Hardwood forest and other types of forest border farmland.

OBJECTIVES

Working Together to Protect Species at-Risk on Farms plans to work with producers and partners to protect this unique forest type, as well as other woodland species by:

- Educating and encouraging the conservation of Appalachian hardwood forests
- Creating a landowner stewardship program to recognize farmers who implement Best Management Practices
- Working to restore Appalachian hardwood forests on abandoned agricultural lands
- Updating farm plans to include best practices on managing forests
