In Canada, 41% of farms have livestock, and animals like cattle are a common feature on farms in New Brunswick. Pastures and hayfields provide feed for livestock as well as attract wildlife, including species at risk. Species like Bobolink, Eastern Meadowlark, Eastern Painted Turtle and countless others can be found feeding or nesting in pastures.

Keeping livestock, wildlife, and the surrounding area healthy is a priority for the Working Together to Protect Species at risk on Farms project partners. We are working with farmers to explore the best way to help livestock co-exist with at-risk wildlife on farmlands.

OBJECTIVES

Specifically, we are working to:

- Support programs that work to install fencing along watercourses
- Expand opportunities for wetland restoration on farms
- Engage producers on best management practices for sustainable grazing
